#### 2020 IARU HF World Championship (July 11-12th)

From Hunter Mills, K3IE, President, Tennessee Contest Group

It is with great pleasure that I announce that TCG and the Deep Dixie Contest Club (DDCC) have the honor of conducting a joint operation of IARU member society HQ station callsign W1AW during next month's IARU HF World Championship.



This is truly an honor - the last time TCG represented the HQ station W1AW/4 in the IARU Championship was back in 2006.

With this honor comes a huge responsibility. TCG and DDCC will be solely responsible for providing the HQ W1AW/4 multiplier to the world.

The leadership teams of both clubs are currently identifying the member stations that can provide the optimum coverage for all six bands (160/80/40/20/15/10) and modes (CW/SSB) for the 24 hour contest period. Operations will primarily take place from COVID-19 compliant Multi-Op stations but there will be opportunities for members to operate a shift from their own station.

Juan, AC6ZM, is spearheading this effort for TCG and will be the prime contact. Ned K1GU and Ted W4NZ have graciously offered their consultative expertise regarding scheduling logistics and N1MM/Network IT coordination.

If you are comfortable being on the "chaos side" of running a large pile-up and feel your station performs particularly well on a certain band, please reach out to Juan and his team. Or, you may volunteer for a shift at one of our Multi-Op stations. Knowledge of N1MM contest software is critical since it will be used by all entrants.

Shortly, Juan will be providing a Scheduling Grid that will indicate available slots. Please be on the lookout.

The contest is only 5 weeks away and it will take a huge effort from both clubs to put our best foot forward. I have no doubt we will deliver an operation of which we can all be proud.

Along with our friends at Deep Dixie Contest Group, TCG will make W1AW/4 Radioactive!!

#### 2020 IARU HF World Championship (July 11-12th)

The IARU HF World Championship is fast approaching. It is essential that the global COVID-19 pandemic must be taken into account when planning participation, including by IARU member-society HQ station teams.

Multi Operator and IARU Member Society HQ Station operations must adhere strictly to the regulations and physical distancing guidelines issued by the responsible health authorities and the World Health Organization and in effect at the time of the event, even if observing the guidelines is not legally required in their locations. This requirement also applies to Single Operator stations and especially to those hosting guest operators. This may reduce participation but it is vital that the IARU, its member societies, and individual radio amateurs behave as responsible members of the global community.

The special rules governing IARU Member Society HQ Stations allow for multiple sites to be used, again subject to national regulations. HQ stations will be able to be active, but possibly not at their usual level.

#### **Temporary Rule Waivers:**

1) For Field Day 2020 only, Class D stations may work all other Field Day stations, including other Class D stations, for points.

<u>Field Day rule 4.6</u> defines Class D stations as "Home stations," including stations operating from permanent or licensed station locations using commercial power. Class D stations ordinarily may only count contacts made with Class A, B, C, E, and F Field Day stations, but the temporary rule waiver for 2020 allows Class D stations to count contacts with other Class D stations for QSO credit.

2) In addition, for 2020 only, an aggregate club score will be published, which will be the sum of all individual entries indicating a specific club (similar to the aggregate score totals used in ARRL affiliated club competitions).

Ordinarily, club names are only published in the results for Class A and Class F entries, but the temporary rule waiver for 2020 allows participants from **any Class** to optionally include a single club name with their submitted

#### ARRL Field Day Rule Changes for 2020 Will Benefit TCG

Field Day 2020 is an Excellent Opportunity to allow TCG to "Shine", once again.

Field Day Rule 4.6 has been revised to allow Class D Stations (Home Stations) to be permitted to count contacts with other Class D Stations. This is in addition to counting contacts with Class A, B, C, E & F Field Day Stations. In addition, **for 2020 Only**, an aggregate club score will be published, which will be the sum of ALL of the individual entries indicating a specific club (TCG).

Score Submission guidelines from Paul Bourque, N1SFE, ARRL Contest Program Manager: The 3830 scores submission is not an official ARRL Field Day entry. All entries must go to the ARRL via the web submission form at <a href="https://field-day.arrl.org/fdentry.php">https://field-day.arrl.org/fdentry.php</a> or vial postal mail. NOTE: You DO NOT need to be an ARRL member to participate and submit scores!!!



## Ham Station Comfort & Layout is Critical for Contesters & DX'ers

Being an "ole-man" (OM) DXer and contester for at least forty-two years, I have accumulated a lot of junk. I must admit to some degree I am a pack-rat and do not desire to get rid of many hand-me-downs. I see junk from others as treasures that I can possibly use in the future to benefit my ham station contesting & DXing capabilities. However, this mind set can have its pitfalls that we will focus in the remaining portion of this article.

The picture(s) of my current ham shack (Picture 1) explains it all, showing a lack of mobility within the shack. The challenge is determine if the shack is laid out in an efficient and comfortable manner for DXing and contesting. The obvious thought is not a chance! One might ask, "How does he even maneuver with all of that clutter?" This is a good point, how do I?

This view of my shack shows absolutely no room for additional storage or movement within the shack, not even so-cializing a guest visitor. Can you find the 2m transceiver under the computer monitor in the picture above? Can this station be improved? Can you see where improvements can be made? What can I do to make my ham shack better for operating especially long duration operating required for contesting? You are probably thinking that, "I hope none on the junk on the shelf falls on his head? Why does he have patch cables hanging? Do I see a gun safe in that small area?" Perhaps you have many proactive ideas to provide to me.

Picture 2 is my main operating position. Perhaps there are many thing that can be done to improve the operating position. One may ask, "Why is my secondary operator a four-legged "dear? What benefit is my four-legged "dear" during a contest or working a DXpedition? Why does he have three microphones and a Heil Pro Series headset within arm's reach? How did AC4G get all of that equipment on such a small desk? Why are two (2) HF amplifiers next to each other?" These are all valid points and reasons why I need to renovate my ham shack.

Recently, after a major contest perhaps the CQWW CW Contest, I realized that my score was not good enough to be a top contender. I began wondering why and what I could do to improve my scores for all future contests, state QSO parties, and general DXing. I first had to figure out some of the strengths of my shack (if any?), but most of all identify the many weaknesses regarding my ham station and ham station layout. From Picture 3, one can see a major fallacy with my station configuration with the CW key and logging computer.

The problem with this layout is that operator must send CW with their right hand, while logging with their left hand resulting in crisscrossed arms. Yes, typing a callsign and utilizing N1MM+ logging software at the same time. The same situation occurs dur-

ing phone contests speaking into the microphone with the right hand, while logging with the left hand/arm. Some may call me superman, while other may call me an idiot. Please hold comments to yourself.

Other concerns with my configuration (seen in previous Picture 2) are that I also have rotor control boxes on shelves too high and unreachable unless partially standing up to move antenna rotor position. I also have power supplies powering the HF transceiver which have no business on the same level as the transceiver. Likewise, antenna switches cannot be reached with ease. Finally, the logging computer box should not be at the same level as the HF transceiver and on the right side of the transceiver as shown in Picture 3.

Can you image how long an operator can endure this position in a major contest running 48 hours? I quickly became exhausted, frustrated, and could only sit at the operating position for two or three hours at most before giving it up, powering down all equipment, and turning in for the night or lasting only a few hours on a morning trying to survive these conditions and add QSOs to my contest log. Sometimes I got all tangled up in cords and my arms became tangled.

I already alluded to many problems with my existing ham shack configuration. The first major issue here is combining two (2) hobbies in one small room. I have all of my hunting supplies, boxes of ammunitions, a gun safe, and other supplies in this small area with my ham radio gear & equipment. Second, I have ham radio equipment sitting on shelves and under the desk top making it difficult to maneuver. Third, the layout of ham equipment is very inefficient. The current layout did not take into consideration comfort and efficient operating. Yes, I have seen other ham shacks on QRZ.com; in online pictures on the internet, and in different presentations throughout the years also only to find most not being configured properly. But I want to correct my stations to make it more efficient. I pondered many times how to do this. I know when setting up a contest station, much thought needs to be considered for comfort, but a close second is function by the operator.

Where could I get some ideas and expertise? Finally, after discussing my ham shack deficiencies with one of my Elmers, Bob DePierre, K8KI, we both concluded that a total renovation of the AC4G ham station was in order. We first realized that I had to remove everything out of the current shack. Secondly, I had to commit to keep other hobbies out of the ham shack in order to provide a layout conducive to serious contesting, DXing, and general operating. Third, I had to plan out a layout that makes common sense, but a layout that I wish I currently had in place making comfort a primary role in the design of a winning contest station and ham shack. I made a commitment to adhere to these simple rules.

Next, with the help of Bob, K8KI, and after some discussion regarding logical placement of ham equipment, to include power supplies, rotor control boxes, antenna switches, and the computer & monitors, we converted my desires on paper to include measurements of the room and the furniture to be included in the shack. Below in Picture 4 is the simple layout to improve my operating abilities and increasing my contest scores to hopefully be a top contest contender.



After we formulated a plan, I began removing everything out of the shack. My problem was to figure out where to permanently place my hunting gear and the extra ham radio treasures collected over the years. After figuring out a home for these treasures, I was on my way to developing a first-class ham shack.

The inside of the shack shown in Picture 5 shows lots of work to be done such as relocating electrical outlets for the amplifier and basic AC components, repairing drywall, painting walls, installing a new standard 36" door, new carbon fiber flooring or hard wood floors and finally place nice looking desk/tables to hold the ham equipment. My son and I will make these renovations. Afterwards, I will install some nice cherry finished furniture. Then I can work on some shelving to be placed under the desks to hold power supplies and one or two computers. I will also be designing and building table-top shelving for antenna switches and rotor control boxes.

As of this writing, I am in the middle of this renovation/construction project (Pictures 6 and 7), but have a goal to finish soon, especially since we are entering the six (6) meter season.

Unfortunately, due to the worldwide COVID-19 pandemic, many needed DXpeditions this summer 2020 to exotic countries have been cancelled, but this is allowing me to wisely execute my major renovation plan of a complete ham shack renovation make-over due to the "stay-at-home" orders directed by the President of the U.S., Leaders of other world-wide countries, and Governors of most U.S. states.

After completion of this renovation, I believe I will be able spend more time in a more comfortable operating position boosting my contest scores and DXCC countries. This will require the addition of a nice comfortable chair. I also hope to be able to have my computer keyboard straight in front of me making computer logging much more easier by being able to enter callsign/contest exchange information by typing on the keyboard directly in from of me and viewing the monitor off to each side of the HF transceiver.

## Ham Station Comfort & Layout is Critical for Contesters & DX'ers (cont.)

I will also be able to adjust my HF transceiver sitting directly in front of me, be able to tune my amplifier with ease, change antenna positions & turn my rotor control box, and adjust an antenna switch with ease sitting in my chair instead of having to stand up or partially stand up as I had to do before. I will be in the cockpit of a sophisticated and complex contest station. Picture 8 depicts the newly added floor joists and black plastic laid above the dirt. Termite guards have also been added. Progress continues daily.

The next items to be completed will be installing electrical outlets in the floor, adding a new breaker box to the outside of the shack, a new subfloor, new carbon or hardwood flooring, a new door and case, and painting the ceiling and walls.

There are many ideas and pictures on the internet that show good and bad ideas. With a common sense approach and well thought plan by executing a wish list of ideas, anyone can be a top contender in any ham radio contest or be on top of the Dxpedition pile-ups.

Perhaps you too should weigh the pros and cons of your ham shack. Should you step back and seriously evaluate your station? Do you have room to improve your ability to endure in contests while perhaps being a top contender in most of the major amateur radio contests and DXpeditions? Stand back, make an objective evaluation of your shack, make a realistic plan, and execute the plan even if it is only moving clutter out and rearranging equipment. I'd recommend a serious evaluation sooner than later! I am glad I took time to do it.
